

The John Armstrong Story

Legend has it that the name Armstrong was bestowed by the King of Scotland to one of his armour bearers who went to the assistance of his Master in battle, by grasping him bodily and setting him upon his own horse. For this service the King gave him land and the name 'Armstrong'.

Records of the family branch for which Armstrong Creek is named begin when John Armstrong was born in 1809 in Scotland. John was the fourth child of William and Elizabeth and in 1927 he married Vair Scott, a relation of the Scottish novelist, Sir Walter Scott.

In July 1839 John, Vair and their five children set sail for Australia aboard the "Palmyra". During the four month voyage another son was born before they disembarked at Geelong in November 1839.

They were initially employed by the lady pastoralist, Anne Drysdale, John to plough and shepherd and Vair to cook and wash. The diary of Anne Drysdale tells the story of her relief that despite Vair's' imminent confinement, the catering for the shearing season was completed without interruption. Anne Drysdale also documented her high regard for the Armstrongs, as reliable, hardworking employees.

They and their children worked hard and in 1841 took up land known as Bush Station, which included the site of the present city of Geelong. They built their home on the land where Geelong College now stands and the original station extended as far as Barwon Heads and Torquay.

John Armstrong and his family were pioneer pastoralists in Victoria and were for many years recognized as the most perfect sheep masters in Victoria. John was the first to adopt the well-known remedy for dipping sheep to cure scab and all insect pests.

Within 13 years the Armstrongs' had amassed 60,000 head of sheep and went on to have six more children who were born at Bush Station.

A flour mill was erected on the Torquay Rd, called the 'Connewarre Mill'. It was a three storied building which supplied flour for early pioneers around Geelong. The mill was powered by steam from a nearby creek that soon became known as Armstrong Creek. This is, of course,

where Warralily Coast is today.

John was a foundation member of the Free Presbyterian Church in Geelong, a founding member of the Geelong Agricultural Society and a founding member of Melbourne's Scotch College.

John Armstrong died at Bush Station in 1856 at the age of 47. During his 17 years in Australia he had become a landowner and was known as a knowledgeable, hardworking member of the new colony, an innovative farmer, and was well respected by all who

After Johns' death, Vair, his wife, went to live at Garden St in Geelong. She was known as a hardworking mother of 13 children and she died in 1877 aged 68 years. John and Vair are buried at Eastern Cemetery in Geelong where an obelisk was erected in their memory by their church.

The post script to this story occurred a few months back when the Great Grandson of John Armstrong walked into the land sales office at Warralily to see all that's been happening on the land his ancestor lived and worked. all those years ago. Graeme Wallace-Smith now lives in Barwon Heads and provided the information for this story from his own family records. He and his family are thrilled that the Armstrong name has been immortalised in the name of our suburb, and they watch with great interest as our new community develops.

Developer's Update - FAQ's November 2014



Q: When will the Neighbourhood Activity Centre (NAC) be finished and what will it include?

A: The future Neighbourhood Activity Centre will be called Warralily Village and will include a full line Woolworths supermarket, as well as a range of small retail, health and lifestyle businesses. Council will also construct a Community Wellbeing Centre with a Maternal Child Healthcare Centre and Long Day Care Centre as part of this development. The developer is under lease contract to have the site opened in 2017.

Q: How can businesses express interest in being part of the NAC?

A: Businesses should contact one of our land sales offices to register their details. Those who have registered their interest will be invited to an information session once more detail about the NAC is finalised.

Q: When will Warralily Boulevard be completed?

A: Linking both sides of the community with the completion of Warralily Boulevard is a priority. We anticipate completion of Warralily Boulevard in line with completion of the NAC in 2017.

Q: When will Bus routes start within Warralily?

A: Bus service providers have advised that bus services around the estate will start when Warralily Boulevard is opened between Surf Coast Highway and Barwon Heads Rd.

Q: When will the Creek Works be complete?

A: The bulk earthworks construction of Armstrong Creek between Barwon Heads Road and Horseshoe Bend Road will be complete early in 2015 and will become operational by the middle of 2015. Planting will be complete by spring 2015 and pathway construction will commence at the end of 2015. The remaining section of Armstrong Creek from Horseshoe Bend Road to the Surf Coast Highway will remain in its current natural state with landscape works programmed at the creek reserve edges in line with subdivision delivery, with completion expected in 2016.



Q: When will local schools be built?

A: The state Government have purchased land for a primary, secondary and special needs school at Warralily. Construction of the Primary and Special Needs Schools will commence in 2016, with the school expected to be open for enrolment in 2018. Funding for construction of the Secondary School has not vet been announced. The Catholic Education Board has taken ownership of land

in Warralily Promenade which will be developed as a Catholic Primary School. The site is located on Warralily Boulevard. An information board has been erected on the site with information for families to express interest directly.

What elements are planned to enhance community amenity along the creek?

A range of static exercise equipment stations are planned and will be installed at intervals along the Creek in the near future, with the first going in early in 2015. A basketball/netball practice half court will also be installed along the Creek during the first guarter of 2015 with another to be installed in the Coast T Park in the coming months.

What are the plans for further development of the T Park?

A: The T Park had been designated by the City of Greater Geelong as a future transit corridor, although no current plans exist for its development COGG are reluctant to allow a large investment of assets to be installed We are developing the T Park to maximise it as a large open space, ideal for community events, BBQ's, kicking the footy or playing cricket with room to run. Further pathways. seating elements and landscaping will enhance its purpose and provide a direct link to Armstrong Creek. The large cypress trees will be retained and their amenity maximised for shade, habitat and meandering pathways.

Why has more investment gone into the entrance on Barwon **Heads Rd than Coastside Drive?**

A: Warralily Boulevard is the main Road in the Warralily estate. When completed, this will become the main Warralily Coast entrance. Coastside Drive will be the secondary entrance.

What arrangements are there to encourage responsible dog ownership?

A: Council have advised that no further dog clean up bag stations will be approved because they cause further environmental issues as people tend to leave full bags along pathways. There are currently no off lead areas for dogs at Warralily but the City of Greater Geelong website has a map of dog parks. Any instances of aggressive or nuisance dogs should be reported directly to COGG or the Police.



Q: What information is available about the Conservation Park?

A: The Conservation park is a fenced off 10 acre area bounded by Carter RD, Wild Oak Ave, Whitecliff Way and Yellowbox Ave. It has been set aside in its natural state, as a bushland refuge for flora and fauna. Pathways have been constructed to allow resident access to enjoy the amenity of the Conservation Park. Dogs must be kept on leads and walked on the pathways to protect this special environment. No timber can be removed and grass cutting will be kept to a minimum.

Q: When and where will bins and bike racks be installed?

A: Bins and bike racks have been ordered and will be installed on delivery in the coming weeks.

Q: What is the purpose of the Living **Display Gardens area at Warralily** Coast? A: The Living Display Gardens are a

temporary use of space on future allotments that the developer has set aside to assist the community in the delivery of private gardens in accordance with the Design Guidelines. This is in response to feedback from existing residents to provide examples and greater vision as to what is deemed allowable and the type of outcomes that can be achieved within private gardens. It has also been an opportunity to showcase some of Warralily's local landscape contractors in support of growing local business and the community.

What is the purpose of the Coast

Community Lounge? A: The Coast Community Lounge is an interim arrangement to provide the functions of a Community Centre until the bricks and mortar version is built in 2016 at Warralily Village shopping precinct. Until then, this space will provide a place for community courses, classes, activities, meetings and groups. If needed, local service providers will be invited to book the space for service delivery. Examples of this may include early childhood activities, youth activities, parenting, exercise, art and craft, first aid, or sustainable living groups.

Q: How can residents have access to the Coast Community Lounge?

A: Residents who have queries about using the space for professional, or personal bookings, are invited to contact Warralily Community Development Manager, Kylie Pollock at kyliepollock@warralily.com.au

What can be done to improve phone coverage in the area?

We are advocating strongly for significant investment in communications infrastructure. Telstra are aware of the situation and have advised that an important announcement regarding infrastructure will occur in the near future.

How can I find out about timing of delivery of creek works, residential stages, parks, etc.?

Contact your Estate Manager who can answer most queries, or they will seek clarification from the Warralily Development team.

When are Warralily assets handed over to the City of **Greater Geelong for ongoing** maintenance and care?

Engineering Assets are now handed over to Council after one year from achieving Practical Completion which is prior to receipt of Titles. Landscaping assets are handed over to council after two years (two growing seasons) from practical completion of the landscape asset installations.

How does the developer monitor ongoing Contract Covenant Compliance?

(eg; Building within 2 years of settlement, completing landscaping within 6 months of achieving the Certificate of Occupancy, ongoing landscaping and nature strip maintenance etc.

An audit was recently conducted to document properties with potential issues and a new Warralily team member has been appointed who will work onsite to manage landscaping rebates and ongoing Contact Covenant Compliance. Additionally, The City of Greater Geelong has imposed significant fines to any lots that have remained overgrown after commencement of the fire season.

How can I best protect myself and other residents against activity that seems suspicious or illegal?

A: Any suspicious activity should be reported to the police immediately via the 000 phone number. The developer currently provides a security service whose primary purpose is to protect building site, display homes and Estate property. This service will also respond to current issues being experienced by residents. The phone number for Hume security is 0488 532 531.

Q: How can I become more involved in my community?

A: The Warralily Residents group meet once a month to plan community activities and to discuss and plan Neighbourhood Watch activities.
