We're thrilled to share that the Stage 37 Village Park masterplan has officially been given the green thumbs-up by the City of Greater Geelong, and we're on track for a 2024 delivery. Characteristic of our approach to preserve Mother Nature's gifts, a River Redgum standing tall at the heart of the 7500m2 parkland will be retained, with the playground literally designed around it. Smaller Redgums lining the northern boundary and a dead stag to the south will also remain to create habitat for local birds and critters. It's all about fostering a natural ecosystem right here in our community.

The park's central location, accessible through the network of pathways, will become the neighbourhood's go-to gathering spot. The grown-ups can catch up and share stories at the picnic shelter, while the little ones embark on energy-expending adventures on the new timber playground equipment - suitable for kids of all ages and abilities. There'll be a sandbox for those aspiring builders, complete with diggers and a sand play table. Climbing nets, slides, and balance equipment for the thrill-seekers, a space for a friendly game of kick-about, basketball, and netball, plus some skateable elements for those who roll with it. And we haven't forgotten classics like foursquare and hopscotch! For hands-on, nature-filled fun, there's a nature exploration area. Stay tuned for future updates.

Other development works in progress include:

Whites Rd and Airport Rd - The Stage 23 entry is nearing completion. Residents will soon be greeted by a small wetland reserve featuring walking paths and trails surrounded by old river red-gums. Native grassland reestablishment of the area is planned to kick off in Feb/March 2024, including future works along Airport Road to create a community greenway.

Stage 105 Linear Park - The old Alcoa easement is being transformed into a key linear park connection from Armstrong Creek heading south towards Warralily Boulevard. In the future the linear park will extend through to the southern tributary of the creek. With spring upon us, grassing works have commenced to enable the parkland connection to be open to the community for Summer.

Horseshoe Bend Rd Local Activity Centre - The local activity centre vision is taking shape, with the City of Greater Geelong undertaking master planning for the passive and active open space area and the Department of Education progressing with planning for the future primary school.

Barwon Heads Road East Wetland System - We are delighted to announce that the wetland system on the eastern side of Barwon Heads Road is completed and growing nicely. See the Mayor's update for news on nearby works at Sparrowvale Wetland Reserve.

West Precinct Creek Masterplan - Plans to extend the current shared pathway network along the creek corridor are progressing through council. Soon we will be able to walk, run or ride from Barwon Heads Rd all the way through to Airport Rd in Mt Duneed. Now, that's a truly connected community!

Surf Coast Highway and Whites Road Intersection - Works will commence later this year for completion in 2024.

Armstrong Creek Southern Tributary - Drainage and creek construction works along the southern boundary of Warralily from Horse Shoe Bend Road through to Charlemont Road to the east are due to be completed in 2024. This rural interface will be a significant civil engineering and landscaping project, incorporating a shared pathway, exercise stations, indigenous plantings and subdivision works. Once completed the shared pathway will connect into the various linear parks and form a loop exercise circuit.

One of the distinctive features about Armstrong Creek is its stunning environmental assets.

The public open space and parks; the hiking and biking trails; there are so many opportunities to explore and connect with nature.

The restoration of the Warrality 'Green Spine' has seen it become the centrepiece of the community.

It is a stunning example of the positive social and cultural benefits that arise from having a thriving and diverse ecosystem.

Council is proud to have added another significant slice of public open space to the area. The first stage of Sparrovale Wetland Reserve Ngubitj yoorree was opened in Charlemont last month.

The land was acquired by the Council in 2019.

It provides a solution to stormwater runoff from the adjoining residential areas, managing impacts on the adjoining internationally important Connewarre Wetlands.

And at 500 hectares, it is now our biggest nature reserve and home to wildlife like the majestic brolga, and migratory shorebirds such as sharp-tailed sandpipers.

We encourage community members to visit Sparrovale, with spots to picnic, bird watch or to take a relaxing walk.

The creation of the nature reserve has been a huge task, but there are still two more stages of work to come.

In time, Sparrovale will connect to the existing trail along the Barwon River, providing a continuous ecological and recreation corridor.

Council has a 20-year masterplan, stretching out to 2040, which will see the reserve become a key tourism, environmental, cultural and recreational site.

thousands of birds live and visit.

Over 150 different kinds of birds live there - WOW.

Some birds live there all the time and others stop there for a while then fly away to another lake across the other side of the world.

Lake Connewarre is very shallow so the Greenshanks can wade around on their long yellow legs looking for their dinner.

Their long beaks help them to reach down into the water to pick up their food.

The Greenshanks fly across the world to get to Lake Connewarre all the way from North Scotland and Scandinavia, through China and Russia to Indonesia then finally to Lake Connewarre right next the Warralily.

When they get here they have a big rest and eat up as many insects and little fish as they can. Then in March or April they fly all the way back again where they like to have their babies.

If you visit Lake Connewarre you might see some Greenshanks. Its' fun to take a picnic and explore the Lake at Taits Point. Tell Mum and Dad to turn off Barwon Heads Rd onto Lake Rd, and turn left at Staceys Rd to find Taits Point.

Spring has Sprung

IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN WHEN HOME MAINTENANCE REQUIREMENTS INCREASE AS MOST PLANTS EXPERIENCE FULL GROWTH. THE CITY OF GREATER GEELONG HAVE PROVIDED THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION TO ASSIST HOME AND LOT OWNERS TO UNDERSTAND THEIR RESPONSIBILITIES.

Every November COGG Fire Prevention Officers undertake inspections for grass slashing as we are now in a high fire danger period. These inspections can result in landowners receiving a Fire Prevention Notice due to long grasses on their properties.

VACANT ALLOTMENTS

Owners are responsible for ensuring that grass/weeds on their allotment do not exceed a maximum height of 4" during the bushfire danger period (October to April).

In the case of non-compliance, a warning letter is sent to owner by Council and they are given 2 weeks to mow their grass.

If grass is not mown in 2 week timeframe an infringement notice may be issued (fine amount is \$1,445)

If the owner is still non-compliant Council will send a maintenance company to mow the grass and bill the owner accordingly.

Outside fire danger period (November to March) grass/weeds must be kept maintained at a maximum height of 6" or less. Should the owner not comply the Council will issue a \$300 on the spot fine.

ESTABLISHED HOMES

If weeds/grass exceed a maximum height of 6" a letter will be sent to owners and they may incur an infringement fine of \$300. If a property is not maintained and concerned neighbours complain, an infringement fine of \$300 may apply.

When conducting fire inspections The City of Greater Geelong require grass and weeds to be cut to a maximum height of 100mm (4") and maintained in that condition for the duration of the fire danger period. Failure to comply with a fire prevention notice results in a penalty notice of \$1476.00 as well as costs to clear the property.

AIR FRYER BAKED OAT BANANA BREAD

Ingredients

- 1½ cup Oats
- ½ cup unsweetened Almond milk
- 1 tbsp Maple Syrup
- ½ Banana
- 1 Egg
- ¼ tsp Baking powder
- 1 tsp Vanilla extract
- 15g Chocolate Chips



Directions

- Preheat air fryer to 175 degrees and grease two ramekins with light spray of olive oil
- In a blender, combine all ingredients except Chocolate Chips
- Blend until completely smooth, then pour mixture into the preoiled ramekins and add chocolate chips, making sure they are covered in mixture
- Air fry for 15-20minutes, until golden brown
- · Let cool slightly before digging in
